



Fire Station #6 Public Art Unveiling



City of Topeka Fire Station #6 is the second oldest fire station in Topeka, built in 1935, and is an integral part of the Oakland neighborhood. When the road around Fire Station #6 was redone the fire hydrant was put out of commission and replaced. The Firefighters at station #6 saw an opportunity re-purpose the decommissioned fire hydrant and turn it into public art to honor the Oakland neighborhood. The Firefighter union donated funds to sandblast and prime the fire hydrant and local artist Andy Valdivia painted the hydrant to reflect the rich cultural heritage in Oakland. The fire hydrant is painted to show the Hispanic and German cultures in the neighborhood along with the historic fire station building. In 2018 there were 7 fires in Oakland that resulted in one death, two injuries, one firefighter injury and approximately \$210,000 in damages.

"The firefighters who work in Station #6 love the Oakland neighborhood and its rich culture. We are so excited to re-purpose this decommissioned fire hydrant into public art for all our neighbors in Oakland to enjoy," said Fire Marshal Mike Martin. "We hope that this fire hydrant will remind people of fire safety in their homes and help be a reminder to check your smoke detector to make sure it is working."

-At the unveiling the Fire Department will be handed out applications for free smoke detectors. The American Red Cross also talked about their Sound the Alarm campaign that will be in the Oakland neighborhood on April 27th to install free smoke detectors in homes in the area.

The City of Topeka Fire Department is committed to making sure that our citizens have working smoke detectors in their home in case of a fire and fire safety knowledge.

annual financial report (PAFR). The certificate is the highest form of recognition in governmental accounting and financial reporting.

Recent Updates

- There have been 26 broken <u>water mains</u> year to date. At this time last year there were 92 water main breaks.
- Fire Station Station 3 at 318 SE Jefferson remodeling project to start January 28, 2019. Crews from station 3 will be temporary relocated to Station 4 and Station 2.
- The Utilities Department maintained 182 valves this month. The recent mild weather allowed the Utilities Department to catch up on necessary work to begin valve maintenance.
- The Property Maintenance Rehabilitation program will begin accepting applications February 1st.

Snow and Ice Removal Plan



Winter weather is here. Check out the city's <u>snow and ice removal</u> <u>plan</u>.

You can also see a <u>map</u> of all the streets in Topeka to see if they have been treated.

1. Priority 1: Primary Streets: Arterial Streets and Emergency Snow routes

Service Level – Plowing will typically begin with 2" of snow accumulation. Complete snow and ice control within 24 hours of snowfall ending.



2. Priority 2: Secondary Streets: Collector Streets

Service Level – Plowing will typically begin with 4" of snow accumulation. Complete snow and ice control within 24 hours after Priority 1 completion.

3. Priority 3: Residential Streets: Local Streets

Service Level – Plowing will typically begin with 6" of snow accumulation to ensure that they are passable to emergency services and general public as necessary upon completion of Priorities 1 through 2.
