
Key Revenue Indicators Overview

Property Tax

The ad valorem tax revenues are derived from taxes levied on real property, personal property and state assessed utilities. This is one of the largest revenue sources for the City of Topeka, with ad valorem taxes levied for 3 City funds. Property tax collections for 2018 year to date are \$41,156,327, which is a 1.01% increase over the 2017 collections of \$40,744,294. The City receives property tax allocations from the County primarily twice a year in January and July with a smaller allocation in the fall.





Sales Tax

The City of Topeka receives two sales taxes for direct operations: a city wide 1 cent sales tax for general purposes and a 1/2 cent sales tax set aside for existing street improvements. Total sales tax collections for 2018 year to date are \$35,285,533, which is a 2.30% increase over the 2017 collections of \$34,489,861. The City receives monthly disbursements from the State of Kansas, these allocations have a two month lag compared to when they are collected versus when the City receives them.

1/2 Cent Sales Tax Renewal

In the general election in November there will be a ballot item to *renew* the current 1/2 cent sales tax.

The 1/2 cent sales tax funds **52%** of the forecasted \$24 million spent each year on street projects.

The citywide sales tax program uses about \$14 million raised annually through a 0.5 percent retailers' tax, also known as a sales tax. The funds are used exclusively for costs of maintenance and improvements o existing City of Topeka streets,

gutters, curbs, sidewalks, alleys and street lighting.

Road Construction Update

ROAD CONSTRUCTION UPDATES [7]



The image on the right is a list of featured road construction projects for 2018.

Work continuing on:

- SW Gage between 21st and 25th. Road was opened this week to traffic. There will be temporary/localized lane drops (closures) while sod is being installed.
- SE Adams between 29th and 33rd. Final mainline concrete pours between 29th and the Post Office this week.
- Mill/overlay project in the area of NW Menninger Rd, NW Sproaton, NW Sanford and NW Walnut. Base repairs finishing up this week.
 Mill and overlay should occur next week.
- Mill/overlay project in the Grantville area started on Thursday with base patching. Subgrade may consist of sand so we will modify patching requirements to account for this.
- Central Park. Water line work complete this week and milling the old asphalt started. Some curb and storm sewer work remain before asphalt overlay is placed.
- Alley project off KS Ave underway.
- SW Huntoon at Arvonia. Retaining wall completed.
- Three sidewalk projects are expected to start in the next two to three weeks. Two are Empowerment Grant-funded infill sidewalk projects put forward by the NIA's in their respective neighborhood.

One is on 19th St. – Washburn to Lane; the other is on Randolph St. south from 21st to the first KNI entrance. A third project is a replacement/infill sidewalk project to improve accessibility from major arterials to Robinson Middle School. It is being done as part of the Pedestrian Plan buildout.

Recent Updates

- There were 23 <u>dirt restorations</u> this month with 505 year to date.

 There are 49 dirt restorations from water main breaks still pending.
- The <u>Traffic Division</u> manufactured 55 signs, repaired 29 traffic signals, and processed 141 signal/sign work orders.
- There have been 58 broken <u>water mains</u> this month with 727 year to date. Last year at this time there were 321 breaks.


Food For Fines



The City of Topeka
Municipal Court will
start a Food for Fines
program during the
month of October. Any
person with a
payment due to the
Municipal Court
between October 1st
and October 31st will
receive a \$25 credit
towards their fine with
a donation of ten cans
of non-perishable
canned goods.

All the non-perishable food items that are collected will be donated to Project Topeka.

The food donations allow for a one-time max credit of \$25 for each case. The Food for Fines program only allows for credit in cases with payments being made with the court and not in



collections. The program cannot be used for court costs, diversion fees, reinstatement fees, restitution or seat-belt tickets.

Cans must be taken to the Municipal Court Clerk's office to receive credit. Dented, rusted, non-labeled, or expired food items will not be accepted.
