Road Construction Update

ROAD CONSTRUCTION

 The contractor is now working on the last phase of SW 10th and Wanamaker project, which is the northwest corner of the



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intersection. The project is on track to be completed by June 15, weather permitting.

- SW Gage 6th to Fairlawn project. The opening of SW 6th between SW Gage and the Chalet Apartments is set for May 17. The contractor has some concrete placement around manholes and water valve lids in the roadway before it will reopen.
- 21st and S. Kansas Ave. A one-day closure this past week allowed crews to do necessary water main work. The intersection will be closed for reconstruction in all directions for the summer beginning May 29th. It will open before school starts.
- A public meeting is set for the Central Park Neighborhood Street Resurfacing Project (May 17), the SW Gage – 21st and 25th Street Project (May 23), and the SE Adams – 29th to 33rd Street Project (May 24). Go to the City of Topeka's

Battle of the Badges

With lights flashing and sirens blaring, Topeka law enforcement and fire personnel often arrive first at emergencies, always ready to help. These local first responders will help ensure blood is available during medical emergencies by partnering with the American Red Cross for the Battle of the Badges Blood Drive Thursday, May 17, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., at the Holliday Building, 620 SE Madison.

During the blood drive, the Topeka Fire Department and the Topeka Police Department will compete to see who can recruit the most blood donors. Everyone who comes to give blood can cast a vote to determine who will win this year's bragging rights.

To make an appointment for the 2018 Topeka Battle of the Badges, download the Red Cross Blood Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org or call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) and use sponsor code Topeka.

All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and

younger also must meet certain height and weight requirements.

Recent Updates

- Chief Cochran met with the newly formed Chief's Advisory Board.
- TFD Training Division facilitated a joint training with Topeka Fire Technical Rescue Team, Osage County fire department responders, and KU Fire Rescue Training Institute on grain engulfment rescue.

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- The Planning Department was awarded 3 Historic Preservation Grants from the State of Kansas on May 5th including 1) Historic Garlinghouse Resources of Topeka, KS 1910-1960 (\$20,000), 2) Tennessee Town Intensive Historic Survey Phase #1 (\$14,500), and 3) continued training for Landmarks Commission and staff (\$5,911). In addition to the grants, the State also approved Shiloh Baptist Church in Tennessee Town for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.
- Sylvia Davis, Utilities General Manager graduated from the 2018 Greater Topeka Leadership course. The course consists of eight sessions that teach adaptive leadership through information, dialogue and hands-on experiences.

Native Bee Houses

Belle Avenue Ponds and Jackson Street Retention Area each received a native bee house courtesy of Water Pollution Control. From pollinating gardens to fruit trees to flowers, native bees maybe small in size but they play a big part in our everyday lives. Native bees are solitary and gentle, they play a big part in keeping Topeka beautiful.

Female native bees will use nesting trays and natural reeds to lay their larvae inside a cocoon along with a pollen loaf. The pollen will feed the larvae during hibernation until it emerges in the spring.

Don't be alarmed when you see a bee house! Water Pollution Controhas posted signs about the bee

houses to let you know there could be native bees in the area. The bees are more concerned about their work and don't mind you watching them.
